

I was introduced to this book through my book club and what a gem it turned out to be. Bligh is synonymous with Australian history - his amazing feats which are well delineated in this writing really

capture the imagination in such a way that you feel you are actually part of the experience. My knowledge of Bligh was primarily centred around the the mutiny on the 'Bounty' so it was quite a revelation to realise what an extraordinary man he was. The navigational charts and maps that he was responsible for have been invaluable since he created them - his seamanship was second to none. This book not only brought to life a career at sea but it also touched on Bligh's home and family life. I think the entire book was very well balanced and I found it very hard to put down. I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to read and enjoy Mundle's thoughts on an extremely influential but often maligned hero.

This is an incredible story. The book starts out slow but once Bligh is on the Endeavor in an effort to bring bread foot back the story comes to life. It was frustrating to not understand the real causes of the mutiny. Perhaps even Bligh never understood but some piece of the puzzle is missing. Either Bligh changed his leadership style or the real cause of the mutiny remains a puzzle.
