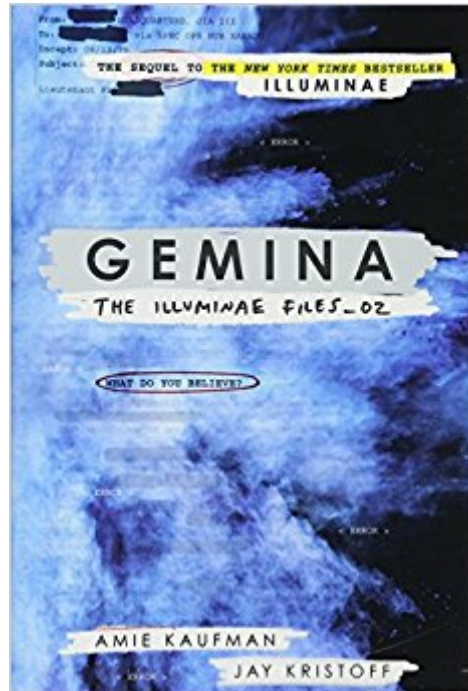

While the first book in the series, *Illuminae*, followed the account of the *Hypatia*, the only surviving spacecraft of the Kerenza colony attack, as it hurtled toward the Heimdall space station for sanctuary, this sequel describes the experience of Hanna, who lives aboard the Heimdall. She is the daughter of the space station commander, and while this remote post is fairly quiet, her world unravels when agents attempt to seize control of the space station in order to destroy it and ensure no witnesses survive. Hanna finds an unlikely ally in Nik, an unsavory gang member who deals "dust" in the space station, as they attempt to defend the Heimdall, save the *Hypatia*, contain vicious alien creatures, and fix a rip in the space-time continuum. The narrative is presented in a dossier-style compilation of emails, journal entries, diagrams, and transcripts. These documents serve to convey the deeply satisfying story line in a creative and engaging way, making this series an exceptional recommendation for discerning and reluctant readers. The characters are intensely believable, and it will be easy for teens to share in Hanna's losses, betrayals, and accomplishments. Kaufman and Kristoff have woven such an intricate and compulsively readable tale that fans can revisit the text and make new discoveries each time. This review was originally posted on my blog, June Reads Books. As was completely expected, Gemina was a rollercoaster and I was hanging on tightly to discover the end. This second installment of the Illuminae Files takes place at the space station Heimdall that Hypatia and all the people aboard have been fighting to reach the whole last book. The story opens just before a station-wide celebration of a holiday. Cue Hanna, the spoiled station captain's daughter who will stop at nothing to get her way. She's planning the perfect expensive outfit for the perfect date with her boyfriend to the big celebration at the station. Until suddenly the station is ambushed by BeiTech. Suddenly people are dying left and right, and she is cut off from her boyfriend. The only people able to team up with Hanna to save their station are two cousins from a criminal gang. About two thirds of the way through the book, the crew on Hypatia are able to make contact with the space station and both discover themselves in a nearly impossible phenomenon that has caused two alternate universes to merge as one. Not only do Hanna and her team need to save their space station from their invaders, but now they also need to team up with the crew from Hypatia to save their universe from collapsing. Of course the whole book is filled with strategic ass-kicking and grotesque deaths, because what else would you expect from Kaufman and Kristoff? A cool aspect that separates this book from the previous is the illustrations by Marie Lu. Hanna is a creative thinker and best processes things by doodling in her journal. Many of her journal pages throughout the invasion are included with the files and allow for the reader to connect with her and other characters on a deeper level. I love this addition to the storytelling. My favorite aspect of Gemina, though, was the amount of character growth developed throughout this intense reading experience. Each of the characters (at least the ones that outlived others longer) were fully fleshed out and came out the other end as a changed person. It made me root for the characters even more. Gemina follows Illuminae as one of my favorite reads this year. Kaufman and Kristoff have this habit of ripping your beating heart out of your chest, crushing it, inflating it with a breath of hope, repeating this a couple times, and then shoving your heart back into your chest, filling you with every emotion in the book. Now dump some delightful romance into the madness that will warm up that very heart that is going through so much turmoil. I anxiously await the third and final

installment with bated breath.

Though I didn't like this book as much as its predecessor, ILLUMINAE, I did really like it. The biggest reason I found it slightly less enjoyable than the first book was that it was impossible to reproduce the first book's originality; trying to do basically the same thing a second time was inevitably going to provoke feelings of "been there, done that." There were also a few other things that interfered with my enjoyment of GEMINA:--the unrelenting teen-snarky repartee was a bit much for me--I'm getting tired of "kick-butt heroines" in YA--I didn't much care for the male lead, a small-time thug and member of a crime family--the subplot with the brain-sucking monsters was way too much like the "Alien" franchise. But other than that, I found this book as intense and fun as the original. The plot kept me turning pages, the majority of the characters (especially a character with a disability) were well rendered, and the ingenuity of the concept continues to impress me. I have to really love a series to read past book 1, but in the case of this series, I can see myself buying the books as long as the authors keep turning them out.

We usually see the same type of characters in YA, but these characters were some of the best that I've read about in a while. The format of this book was even better than that of the last book. So much more was introduced. It was super cool to see the artwork of Marie Lu. She is an artistic genius! I loved all of the IMs and emails and files and just how you got to know each character with this format. You get to see the story in a different light. You get duped into a lot of things because of the dynamics of the story and the unique way it is told. This book is so fast-paced (in the best way

ever) and so action-packed, that it is literally impossible to put this book down. I AM SERIOUS. I read this book, being almost 700 pages, in TWO DAYS. If I didn't have class and didn't have to go to sleep, I would have stayed up all night reading it that first day! If I haven't given you a fantastic reason to pick up this book, then I do not know what would be one. GO DO YOURSELF A FAVOR. READ THIS BOOK.
