In his first novel for young readers, Kluger revisits themes in his adult titles: baseball, romantic sparring, and social activism. Boston teens T. C. and Augie are such close friends that their families acknowledge them as brothers. AlejandraÃ Â has recently arrived from Washington, D.C., where her father served as a Mexican ambassador to the U.S. Written in multiple voices and nontraditional formats, including instant messages and school assignments, KlugerÃ¢â€s crowded, exuberant novel follows the three high-school freshman through an earth-shaking year in which musical-theater-obsessed Augie realizes that he is gay, Alejandra reveals her theatrical talents to disapproving parents, and T. C. tries to make aÃ Â deaf childÃ¢â€s greatest wish come true.

A few plot twists will require readers to suspend belief, and the voices tend to sound alike. This is a wonderfully uplifting story about 3 friends and the summer freshmen year of high school when they discover who they are individually and together. The book follows T.C. Keller, Augie Hwang, and AlÃ© Perez as they battle new feelings, new places, and each other in Brookline Massachusetts. Along the way they find new friends, responsibility, and romance. I have read this book 4 or 5 times now and it never gets old. It's really a go to comfort book to me. Its happy and good and uplifting without feeling cheesy or unrealistic. I am a fan of the epistle style novel and this book takes it to another letter combining journal entries, emails, and instant messages to form a complete picture of these teens lives. I tend to love stories that include good parents and this book does. Not only do you hear from the 3 main characters, but you get fun insights into their parents' lives through emails and other communications. It is a thoroughly enjoyable read.

I discovered Steve Kluger by accident, when I picked up "The Last Days of Summer" at a book fair run by my temple a few years ago. It sat on a shelf for a while, and when I finally read it in 2004 I was knocked out. Since then, I made a point of reading everything by Steve. I was thrilled to hear about the release of "My Most Excellent Year" recently. Only after purchasing it did I realize it was classified as Young Adult fiction. While this book is suitable and wonderful for Young Adults, it's suitable and will be loved by anyone. As in his other books, Steve brings characters to life through little snippets of written communication between the characters. It's a humorous and touching story of a group of teenagers, a younger boy they take under their wing, and their respective families and young love. I was sad when it ended and wished I could follow the lives of these young people as

they grew further into adulthood. (Hey Steve - a sequel or two - or five? It worked for J.K. Rowling...)I recommend this or any of Steve's books for anyone. Incidentally, I've now written to Steve twice and received very gracious replies explaining the inspirations behind the books. He's not only a great writer, he's a great guy.

Hands down one of the best books I've ever read. I fell instantly in love with the author's writing style and found myself completely captivated with each character's individual voice. Books like this tend to not be for everyone, but all of the author's books seem to read like an extremely chipper romantic comedy on speed. Everything is quick witted, laugh out loud funny, sarcastic, and altogether heartwarming in that lovable cheesy way. If you are looking for something with a bit more nitty gritty substance then look somewhere else, but if you are in need of some comfort pie, read this book right now.

For the more mature reader - great book told from multiple points-of-view with three high-school friends who are the main characters. They are almost seniors, and writing an English paper on their most excellent year - all three write about their freshman year and the flashback part of the story is told through their journal entries from freshman year English class. I really like the voice and methods that the story was told in with letters and emails and instant message chats and journals. This was a book that definitely and swiftly made my list of favorites for 2008. It's full of warmth, heart and most of all laughs. After reading it (one-sitting), I knew it was one of those books that you've just got to share with someone, so I lent it out and sure enough, the friend had to keep it. But creating the book in this way is not a gimmick but rather a clever way to have each individual's personality shine through their written medium.
