

I did speed read through a few parts b/c too descriptive of scenery that didn't add to the story at some points. I liked the descriptions of tracking and trail following and what not. Generally enjoy the old west stories. I was disappointed in the ending, b/c though it ends, not a cliff hanger, it just... well ends. There is no finish or follow through on what happened with some characters he was involved with. The story just ended. That bothered me. I think a hundred more pages could have tied up some loose ends and maybe a prologue type chapter. But that is not how his story goes... hence why not 5 stars. Overall, its a good book.

I'm a bonafide L'Amour fan, but this book was not his best work in my opinion. The plot dragged on and on. I found his history, especially of Los Angeles, to be well researched as always. His descriptions accurate and made me feel as though I was there. However, the story seemed stretched and tedious. Any other author and I would have put this book down. Sorry Louis.

Good story. The hero seemed to get caught sleeping a lot more than most of L'Amour's heroes. Lots of twists and turns...a little too many for me, but still a good read.

I have every book Louis L'Amour ever wrote in my library, and I'm slowly working on getting electronic versions of all of them. Nobody writes like L'Amour; in my opinion he has no equal, and likely never will. The world lost one of its greatest storytellers when he passed. And, while I enjoy each and every one of his books, Tucker is one of my favorites. A classic coming of age story that has absolutely nothing clichéd about it, I've lost count of how many times I've read this book. If it's possible that there's anyone out there who hasn't read L'Amour's work, this is one of the stories I would most strongly recommend.

This book is a MUST read. L'amour makes his characters come alive and it's so much more fun to read when you are able to visualize the characters! I would suggest this reading material to anyone who enjoys reading----He makes the journey interesting, the book difficult to put down, and a good lesson to be learned about good moral values as the main character develops from a boy to a man----- never veering from his strong moral compass.
